Emmaus' Trade Training Centre has built strong ties with industry bodies and PEER (training organisation) to provide real employment opportunities. Students who studied a Certificate II Electrotechnology (Career Start) whilst completing their SACE, have been invited to and have successfully gained electrical apprenticeships.

Since my commencement as Manager of the Trade Training Centre, Emmaus students have gained a reputation for being quality applicants that employers are looking to offer apprenticeships.

Our Trade Training Centre is also set to play a key role in preparing students for jobs that have note been created yet. The SA Navel Ship Building contract is predicted to provide new employment opportunities in the very near future. New Books and Keep Reading!

The Library regularly gets new books and resources to cater for different student needs. We are constantly considering different students' requests for funny books, challenging books, books that take them to faraway places, exciting books, mystery books, adventure books, easy-to-read books, historical books, science fiction, fantasy, non-fiction... And the list goes on. The latest addition to our Middle School Fiction collection, *Inheritance* by Carole Wilkinson is an amazing story of time travel, historical fiction, Aboriginal understanding, coming-of-age and social drama... and all within 228 pages! Discuss with your children what you are reading and what they are reading. Encourage your children to try reading something new, to extend the boundaries of their reading choices and to explore new genres. All reading is valuable and creates wonderful opportunities to 'walk a mile in someone else's shoes', to teach empathy, to learn new things and to develop vocabulary and imagination.

Friendship Issues

Friendships are one of the most consistent issues that parents chat to me about in relation to their children.

All children have problems with their friends, either it is making them, keeping them or how to choose better ones and parents are usually the first to know when friendships are in trouble!

It does not really matter how old young people are, friendships will at some stage occupy a lot of their time and energy. Talking to your children about friendships when they are going well is just as important as when they are going badly. Discussing what makes a good friend and encouraging your children to make friends in all aspects of their lives, school, sport and church etc. enables children to accept that friendships can be varied and satisfying. God placed us in families and groups - we are designed to have relationships. Yet navigating relationships is a learned skill that can take some people quite a while to master.

In her recent article "How to respond to your child's friendship issues", educator Linda Stade suggests some really helpful strategies for parents, when their children come to them "broken hearted and feeling as though their world is crumbling."

Linda elaborates on the following points in her excellent article:- Listen without judging or fixing, Empower instead of Catastrophizing, Distract, Press Pause and Problem Solve together when everyone is calm.


