From the Head of Junior School

The Importance of Solid Foundation - Christ our Cornerstone

At the end of this year my husband Kingsley and I will have been married for 30 years. Over the course of that time we have renovated and/or repaired four houses – three of them were between 50 and 100 years old. During that time we were also involved in establishing a brand new Christian school – a school that began from bare dirt. I still remember my first Year 6 PE Cricket lesson in Term 1 of the opening year: I had two cricket bats and 16 tennis balls to use as I taught under and overarm bowling! 

And so I find myself again, in God's journey and calling in life, assisting in the vision of renovations to another building. This time a big building for another new school. What a privilege it was to walk around the new Brooklyn Park site last Wednesday with our Business Manger Ben Raw, and IT guru Matt Starczak. Ben is doing an absolutely outstanding job as the Brooklyn Park Project Manager overseeing every detail through lists and schedules. Please pray for him during this time.

The task on Wednesday was to confirm power and data point locations, digital screen placement, student locker and storage cupboard placement, iPad docking station placements etc. Yes! The dream is becoming a reality and it is all happening!

I have had my first enrolment interviews for Brooklyn Park and the first students have already accepted positions in the new school!

The student consulted sketches for new nature playground areas that I wrote about in Week 3, Term 4 last year, have turned into the first architectural plans of reality for our F-6 Nature Playground area – see the pictures below. We are in the process of transforming a quadrangle and worksite into state of the art learning spaces!

Growth Mindset Lessons

Students from Foundation to Year 9 have experienced lessons on Growth Mindset.

Students were asked to identify the difference between a 'Growth' mindset and a 'Fixed' mindset.

"Take every thought captive" **2 Corinthians 10:5**

Students were challenged to think about their thinking. What is their self talk like? Is it positive?

Mistakes are welcome and seen as part of the learning journey. Mistakes can be seen as opportunities.

Students explored the possibility that you can change your intelligence through hard work, practice, questioning and a desire to develop life long learning habits.

Students are encouraged to use 'yet' at the end of statements, eg *"I cannot tie my shoelace yet"*.

CAT Competition - Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition

The CAT competition fosters lateral thinking and pragmatic problem solving to unearth future talent in computer programming.

The Computational and Algorithmic Thinking (CAT) competition is a one-hour problem solving competition designed to encourage student curiosity and promote multiple modes of thinking.

Students do not need previous computer programming ability but the competition will help identify students' computer programming potential—something that they might not normally have the opportunity to demonstrate.

The competition is an ideal activity to encourage students to solve real-world problems.

The competition has a mixture of multiple-choice and integer answers and incorporates unique 'three-stage tasks' that encourage students to develop informal algorithms and apply them to test data of increasing size or complexity. The original problems are designed to be quick to solve and highly approachable, and range in difficulty from very easy to challenging. Some questions test the ability to perform procedures, others require logical thought, while the more challenging problems require the identification and application of algorithms.

The CAT has four divisions: Upper Primary (Years 5-6), Junior (Years 7-8), Intermediate (Years 9-10) and Senior (Years 11-12).

Forms are available from me. The cost is \$6.60 and will be held on Tuesday 2 April 2019, 9.00am - 10.30am, in the EPAC.

Conversation Starters

I wonder if your afternoon sounds anything like this: You say, “*how was your day at school?*” Then your child says, “*good*”.

Sometimes it can be difficult to get young people to communicate with us. This can be particularly difficult in families, where we have long-standing routines and can become prone to repeating the same conversations. Deep connections are so important to family life, so below I have listed 10 questions you could ask your child instead of “*how was your day?*” May these conversation starters reignite deeper connection between you and your children, or, at the very least, shake up the afternoon drive home!

1. What made you smile today?
2. Can you tell me an example of kindness you saw/showed?
3. Did anyone do anything silly to make you laugh?
4. What was the best thing that happened today?
5. What was the worst thing that happened today?
6. Did you help anyone today?
7. What is something you heard that surprised you?
8. What is something that challenged you?
9. What are you looking forward to tomorrow?
10. What was the hardest rule to follow today?

You could always follow these types of questions with “*why is that?*” or “*tell me more about that?*” to deepen these conversations. And for teenagers, you could add questions about how they are coping with stress, how their friends are going, or what they learned that day that was interesting or important.

Vietnam Cambodia Trip 2019

Emmaus Christian College runs an annual History and Social Justice tour to Vietnam and Cambodia for Year 10 to 12 students. You are warmly welcome to attend the parent and student information night on **Tuesday 5 March at 7.00pm** in the Staff Room.

The ethos of the trip is 'inspiring hearts, inspiring minds': to love others by expanding on 'school knowledge', seeking to understand other cultures' history and society from a different perspective; to explore the challenges and value of a variety of types of aid, both international and national; and to connect personally with people from different cultural backgrounds.

Some highlights from previous trips include:

Vietnam Cu Chi Tunnels, Nui Dat/Long Tan, War Remnants Museum
Cambodia Toul Sleng, Palace, Killing Fields, Angkor Wat, Museum and various Cambodian aid organisations such as Friends International, Children in Families, Justees and Peace Bridges

The trip departs on Friday 20 September and runs for approximately 15 days, with an estimated cost per student of \$3500.00 (this may vary due to the US\$). Payment is added to your payment plan on FACTS. This includes airfares, accommodation, meals, entry fees, travel insurance, internal travel as well as recommended vaccinations and individual travel packs by Globe Medical.

Careers Corner

VET courses provide pathways for students into employment and further education. I often talk with students about being a life-long learner and the opportunities VET courses provide for employment and university studies.

Here are a couple of examples from Alumni VET students:

Last year Victoria studied a Certificate III Individual Support (Ageing) along with Year 12. Tori's career goal was to work in the medical field, in particular nursing/midwifery. As part of her VET studies she was required to undertake 120 hours (3 weeks) of work placement. By the end of the year Tori had achieved her SACE, received a full qualification as an aged care worker and gained an ATAR for university entry. Tori is now enrolled in a Bachelor of Nursing at University and through her work experience, gained employment as a personal aged care worker.

Josh, Ben and Andrew studied a Certificate II Electrotechnology (Career Start) in our Trade Training Centre as well as their Year 12 studies. All students gained apprenticeships at the end of the year with Josh and Ben commencing their employment with PEER early this year and Andrew with a private company. Should they choose, these students will have the opportunity to apply for further studies (including University) which can lead to a career in engineering, site supervision and project management roles.

VET courses strongly focuses on providing students with opportunities and pathways into their chosen career field.

Other Road Safety Tips

When it comes to using a pedestrian crossing, 'near enough is NOT good enough'.

Make the effort to use the crossing even if it means walking a little further.

Crossings are often the best place to cross as drivers will be more alert for pedestrians and generally have to give way. Sight distances to pedestrians are usually best at crossings.

Organise to meet your child at a particular safe place such as the school gate or on the same side of the road as the school or bus stop, providing traffic rules and school policy allow you to do so.

Park your car and walk to meet your child - don't call them to cross the road by themselves.

Try and avoid doing a U-turn in the street if there are children around. It is harder to see children crossing the road behind you and difficult for the children to know that you are going to do an 'about face'.

School Zones and Crossings

School Zones

School zones are installed on most roads around schools - as shown by these signs. A zigzag white line is also usually marked on the road to let drivers know they are approaching a School Zone.



Drivers must not exceed 25km/h at any time of the day or night when a child is in the zone. This includes children walking or riding a bicycle either on the road, footpath or median strip.

The lower speed limit applies whenever children are in the zone, including weekends and school holidays.

It makes sense to slow down as you approach a school at all times of the day and night to check if there are children in the area. Children can be present outside of normal school hours because of many activities that take place in the school.

Emu Crossings

An Emu Crossing has a red 'Children Crossing' flag displayed on red and white striped posts.

When the flags are displayed drivers must give way to pedestrians crossing or about to cross the road.



Emu crossings are located within School Zones, which have a speed limit of 25km/h when children are on the road or footpath.

If the 'Children Crossing' flags are not up, the 25km/h school zone speed limit still applies if there are children present.

Koala Crossings

A Koala Crossing consists of two yellow flashing lights mounted on red and white striped poles.

Koala Crossings operate only when the yellow lights are flashing. A 25km/h speed limit applies between signs on the approaches to the crossing when the lights are flashing, and drivers must stop and give way to anyone using the crossing or about to cross the road.

School monitors may be present at the crossings and it is important to obey the Stop signs used by the monitors.



Wombat Crossings

A Wombat Crossing consists of a wide road hump marked with thick white stripes.

A 40km/h speed limit applies at all times within 30-40 metres of the crossing as shown on signs.



When a pedestrian is crossing or about to cross the road, drivers must stop and give way.

Parking Signs

No Stopping signs



You must not park or stop in a No Stopping area for any reason.

No Parking signs



You can only stop in a No Parking area for the immediate purpose of picking up or dropping off passengers or goods. The driver must remain with the vehicle and take no more than 2 minutes.

Parking Restrictions

Near school crossings

Parking is generally banned at school or other pedestrian crossings for 20 metres before and 10 metres after the crossing, unless signs indicate otherwise.

It is important not to park near crossings as it can make it harder to see children and other pedestrians using the crossing.

Double Parking

It is illegal to 'double park' by stopping next to another car already parked near the kerb. Double parking restricts access for other traffic and can block sight lines for children on the side of the road.



Parking across driveways

You should not park across a driveway. Restricting access to driveways is illegal and can inconvenience the property owners.

Continuous Yellow Line

A continuous yellow line marked on the edge of the road has the same meaning as a no stopping zone.

No parking allowed at any time if there is a yellow line.



Parallel Parking

Unless there are signs or markings on the road to indicate some other method, you must park parallel to the edge of the road and footpath.

The rules are:

- Park your vehicle so that it is facing in the same direction as the moving traffic.
- Unless permitted by a parking sign, leave a minimum of 3 metres between your vehicle and any continuous dividing line.
