Dear Families and Friends

God's Word

A number of you will have heard me mention before that every school holidays, I look forward to spending some retreat time with God – just Him and I, usually at a BnB or by the sea. This time it was for two days in my home lounge room and a day by the sea.

A few weeks prior, God had placed on my heart what the focus of that time should be. It had come after a whole staff Professional Development session through the series Open Book – a series that our Chaplain Adam Wood is leading staff through. In that most recent session, God had convicted me that I had been spending all my time reading the New Testament, and not much time reading the Old Testament.

So I prayed to the Lord about which OT book it was He wanted me to start reading. The name Samuel kept popping into my head over a two week period, and so that is where I started... It never ceases to amaze me how fascinating it is to read a whole book of the bible in a sitting. It helps to reveal patterns, key words, themes and phrases, that would otherwise be missed if we only read single or small passages of verses here and there.

Another thing that amazes me is that you can read the same passage of scripture, and yet each time you do, God reveals or brings comfort for something different.

As I read 1st and 2nd Samuel in the holidays, God reminded me there is often lengthy time between God's plan from one thing to the next – in fact years! Be patient... How often do we expect God to answer our prayers immediately? Do we inquire of Him and then be prepared to patiently wait upon the Lord?

Other key reminder messages that stood out for me during my retreat time included:

- 1. Seek the Lord in all decision making
- 2. When the Lord has a plan, NOTHING stands in His way
- 3. We need to be willing to obey God's calling
- 4. God promises He will be with us
- 5. God promises to equip us therefore be faithful to do whatever comes before you on a daily basis
- 6. God can be grieved when we are not obedient to His plan for us when we do not seek the Father's heart
- 7. It is the Lord that calls and blesses. It is also the Lord that gives consequence to those that do not honour the Lord's direction we surrender any grievance we may have to the Lord
- 8. The condition of our heart towards God is very important

We only truly understand the New Testament when we read it in light of the Old Testament, as one book from Genesis to Revelation. I invite you to reflect on your own reading of the Bible. Are you reading both the Old Testament and the New Testament?

May the Lord bless your reading of His Word.


Inquiry Learning

Children are naturally curious about the world around them. They are fascinated to further their understanding. One of the powerful ways we engage and enrich children's learning is through guided inquiry. Teachers seek to find out what the students already know before engaging them in opportunities where they can help identify what else they would like to find out.

In a Science unit "Look and Listen", Year 1 and Year 2 shared what they already knew. Teachers identified that the children brought with them plenty of prior knowledge, so our learning took a few interesting turns. Each of the children wrote down a question that they wanted to research. These questions were sorted into areas of similar interest and then the teachers chose targeted learning experiences that would help the children learn and understand more.

Several of these questions involved electricity giving light. Mrs Robyn Butler's Year 5/6 class kindly came and shared how to build circuits using batteries, globes and wires. Rich engagement and connections came from a "hands on" experience where the older children explained and showed the younger students how this worked. It was quite amazing! As part of our conclusions, the children drew diagrams of torches and circuits, labelling the parts.

Their sense of confidence and agency in this task reflected the powerful learning that had happened when working with the older students. When children engage in inquiry and are actively involved in the learning process, great things happen!

First Aid

Medications on Camps

We have several camps coming up later in Term 3 and we would like to take this opportunity to remind parents of our school policy regarding medications on camp.

Prescription Medication

First Aid Officers can only administer prescription medication when it is accompanied by a Medication Plan for Prescription Medication completed by a doctor.

Over the Counter Medication

Over the counter medication may only be administered to student when it is accompanied by a completed Medication Plan for Over the Counter Medication with a pharmacy label affixed.

These medications include: eye drops, ear drops, creams, ointments, paracetamol, hay-fever/allergy medications, travel sickness tablets, vitamins and nutritional supplements or other alternative medicines. Medication must be provided in its original packaging with a label from the pharmacy attached.

During camp all medication will be kept secure by staff (including Senior School camps). It is for the safety of every student that campers **ARE NOT** permitted to keep medication in their luggage.

If your son/daughter will be attending a camp in Term 3 and may need to take medication on camp please ensure that the College has a current Medication Plan, Asthma Care Plan or other Health Care Plan on record. Health Care Plans must be renewed every 12 months or whenever there is a change in the care needs of your child. If you require a blank Medication Plan or Asthma Care Plan, these can be collected from the Front Office at the College or downloaded from the College website. When completed please return it to Student Services as soon as possible.

Please note that Asthma Care Plans must include details of reliever AND preventer medication if your child is on a preventer.

We would encourage you to plan ahead for your child, particularly considering that the hay fever season begins in September and this may affect some students. Without a current Medication Plan, staff are UNABLE to administer any medication. There is no student self-medication allowed on camps. Please provide your child's Health Care Plan, Medication Plan or Asthma Care Plan several weeks prior to camp.

Music News

Our Music Program at Emmaus has enjoyed continued progress and brought great positivity to students both physically and mentally. We are thankful for the freedom we continue to enjoy to come together as a school community and the ability to enjoy music together. We are also excited to have some performance opportunities for students this term, this started with Worship Bands playing at assemblies last week.

Music staff would like to draw your attention to some important changes relevant to all instrumental students across F - 12:

- 1. Students with lessons scheduled before 8.35am are required to sign in at Student Services before attending their lesson as they miss the morning roll. Daily attendance is recorded by their Home Group teacher during the Home Group period (8.35am to 8.55am). When your child signs in before they go to their music lesson, Debby Scheepers (Student Services) and the Home Group teacher will know that they are in attendance that day and you will not receive an incorrect SMS saying they are absent. This system should ensure we are keeping appropriate records and duty of care for your child. Please note that all year levels need to sign in manually on the paper form rather than scan their student ID card, giving the reason 'Music Lesson'.
- 2. We can also confirm that **all instrumental lessons will now be rotating** to provide a fair system for all students, this includes Senior School students. The exception to this is a lesson before 9am and at 3pm where students can have a set lesson time by arrangement with the family.
- 3. To aid in the development of a strong and lasting extra-curricular music program at Emmaus we have made a significant change to ensembles moving forward.

Students are only eligible for one of our auditioned ensembles if they are a part of the equivalent non-auditioned ensemble. Students that this affects immediately have been notified. We believe this involvement will see students build skills, confidence and give opportunities to lead.
