From the Head of Middle School

Dear Families and Friends

It was a tremendous joy to see our Year 9 students surrounded by their families at our recent Departure and Calling Ceremonies that mark the launch of our Rite Journey program. It is exciting to see expectancy in the students for what this transformational journey will involve. Students are encouraged to leave their childish ways behind and grow in maturity and responsibility. We also recognise that we are and will always be God's children. Jesus Himself said, *"Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."* **Matthew 18:3 (NIV)** How freeing it is to know who we are because we first know 'whose' we are. *"See what great love the Father has lavished on us, that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are!" 1 John 3:1 (NIV)*



The Rite Journey teachers take the three Year 9 academic classes and meet in four single gender Home Groups. They also share four Rite Journey lessons together each week to build relationships, engage in challenges, and to engage in meaningful discussions about what it looks like to transition well from childhood into adulthood. Students have embarked on a year of growth and transformation. They will engage in a range of opportunities to grow their faith, responsibility, relationships and independence. And what a privilege it is to partner with families along this journey! One challenge that many students look forward to with excitement and nervous energy is the 'solo experience' on the Rite Journey camp where students spend time on their own in the outdoors, sleeping for one night under a shelter they create using a tarpaulin and rope. It is a time for self reflection, for students to be stretched beyond their normal comfort zone, to let go and step up, and to realise that we never have to face challenges solo (alone), *"Never will I leave you; never will I forsake you."*

At Emmaus, rather than removing challenges from our young people or rushing in to 'save' them when they encounter hardships, we desire to come alongside them with encouragement and support, that they might grow stronger through the challenge. This not only helps them now but allows them to face future challenges with greater confidence. Having experiences that seemed really challenging at the time but were worked through well become opportunities for them to draw upon. What a joy it is to see students growing this resilience and stepping into all that God has created them to be.

Emmaus Forward Planning

As I type, news of the 4th interstate school closure due to the COVID-19 (Corona) virus has just been announced. I can assure families that Emmaus continues to actively monitor this situation and will continue to make well informed, responsible, and timely decisions as necessary. From what I understand, the interstate schools currently impacted were issued very short notice of closure arrangements. Although I have no reason to believe any South Australian school will similarly be impacted, it is prudent for me to share that Emmaus may be placed in a position of notifying all families of a similar closure in the season ahead too. If this was the case, it is likely there would be little lead time hence encourage you to pay extra attention to your various avenues of contact by the school at this time. As practical, it would be Emmaus' intention to ensure student learning programs continue as usual (just remotely!) during any closure arrangements. I hope and pray however such arrangements are unnecessary.

With respect to forward planning, the Emmaus Board are also embarking on a new season of Strategic and Master Planning. The goal is to ensure our continued faithfulness and stewardship of resources is the focus of our next season ahead. It remains our commitment to provide outstanding facilities and programs for our current and future students. As a part of this process all families, staff, and students (Year 5 and above) will be asked to undertake an Emmaus online 'Sentiment Survey'. This survey is being undertaken and collated by Resolve Consulting, a Christian consultancy organisation supporting Churches and Christian Schools nationally. Next week every family will be sent a link to this Sentiment Survey which should take approximately 20-30 minutes to complete. Students will undertake their survey at school as a part of a normal school day. On behalf of the Board I ask that you invest into this survey as the results will help Emmaus plan successfully for the season of service ahead.

As a part of our Celebrations last year acknowledging our 40 years of ministry and the opening of our Brooklyn Park Campus, we also launched our 40 Year History book "40 Years of Faithfulness". It is with great excitement I share with you that every current Emmaus family will receive a free copy of this history book. It is planned to be distributed together with the 2019 Emmaus Year book in the next few weeks. Please watch out for these two exciting arrivals!

First Aid

Wash, Wipe, Cover tips

Being struck down with a cold, flu or gastroenteritis is unpleasant and disruptive. Many of these common infectious diseases are spread by germs on our hands.

You can reduce the risk of getting sick or passing infections on to others by:

- Washing your hands, particularly after going to the toilet or handling used tissues
- Wiping down frequently touched surfaces
- Covering your coughs and sneezes with a tissue

It is also important to avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth, or handling food, until you have washed your hands. Avoid contact with others if you are sick and if others are sick, keep your distance as much as possible.

By following these simple steps you will help yourself, your family, friends and work colleagues to slow the transmission of colds, flu and gastro.

Sporting News

Swimming Carnivals for 2020 are done and dusted. It is funny to see how much of a difference 24 hours makes in regards to the weather conditions as the Junior School event had perfect conditions and the Middle/Senior event had some challenging conditions to compete in and for staff to work through. The Junior school event was won by Topaz house and the Middle/Senior event was again won by Emerald. This year we included 50m Freestyle, Backstroke and Breaststroke trials in the Junior School program giving those competitive swimmers the chance to qualify for our SACSA swimming team, while their peers had free time. It was great to watch these athletes demonstrate their skills and abilities in their sporting passion. The day was well supported by parents and caregivers providing a carnival like atmosphere which spurred on many of our young swimmers to participate in all stroke heats.

The Middle/Senior event had a total of 14 records broken on the day. This was excellent to see as these students earn their house bonus points for breaking an event record, which will again be done for the Sports Day event coming up later this term. For house captains and leaders it was a great opportunity to meet their house members and get members involved in these sporting opportunities setting a standard for future house competitions.

Our SACSA Under 11 to Open swimming team competed at the Adelaide Aquatic Centre for their annual competition. Last year we had a team of 19 athletes, this year we had a team of 34. We finished overall Champions and third in the Challenge Shield. This is a great result and the team displayed excellent sportsmanship, support for one another and resilience to achieve their very best which was noticed by other school staff and spectators. The team was very well managed by Mrs Morgan Marinakis, Mrs Susan Van der Merwe, Mrs Mandy Nield and supported by caregivers, thank you. We also had ten Junior School students compete in the local SAPSASA who achieved some very impressive times and four students were selected in City South District Swimming team that will compete at the SAPSASA State Swimming Championships later this term.

Information about after school sporting opportunities for Junior/Middle school in Terms 2 and 3 have been emailed to all parents of children in Years 2 to 7. Like previous years some of these sporting opportunities will not be possible without parental assistance in the form of coaches, assistant coaches and team managers. Attached to the emails are Google form links for each sport that need to be completed by the set due date or we will not be able nominate a College team for that sport. If you would like to be involved you will need to provide a valid Police clearance and RAN mandatory qualification.

Students achievements:

- Joel (Year 10) won the U16's 100m Gold medal with a mid 11 second time that was a second off the State Record set in 2004. He finished the U16's Long Jump third winning a Bronze medal at the State Athletic Championships, and has now qualified for Nationals later this month.
- Orlanzo (Year 8) won the U15's Pole Vault Gold medal achieving a personal best height. He also won the U17's Pole Vault Gold medal, jumping another personal best of 3.70m and broke the State Record for his age that was previously set in 1995 at the State Athletic Championships. He has qualified for Nationals later this month.
- Samuel (Year 11) was a member of the Southern Tigers District Basketball Team that won the Summer Season Grand Final match.
- Fraser (Year 11) finished second in the U18 boys 110m Hurdles and Triple Jump at the State Athletic Championships.
- Omariah, Lucas (T), Lucas (C) and Joshua were all selected in the SAPSASA City South District Swimming Team.

From the Library

Premier's Reading Challenge 2020

All students in the school are welcome to participate in the **Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC)** again in 2020. This is a state-wide reading promotion program that we have been involved in since its inception. Students will receive an acknowledgement of their participation – either a certificate or a medal.

For students in Foundation – Year 2 the reading will happen as part of Library time or classroom shared reading with their teacher.

For students in Year 3 - 6, the participation is expected as part of their regular reading programme and is supported through regular borrowing time in the Library. Students are expected to read 12 books, 8 of which must come from the Premier's Reading Challenge list for their year level (or assumed level of reading. Students who need reading support can speak to the Library staff about their choices.) The books on this list can be found <u>here</u> (Note: DO NOT print this list.... It is 172 pages long!)

Students in Years 7 - 12 are also encouraged to participate in the PRC. The requirements for books from the PRC list are different for this age group. Middle School students, Years 7 - 9, must read at least 4 books from the PRC list at a suitable level of challenge, plus 8 other books that will also challenge them.

Senior School students, Years 10 - 12, may read any 12 books (including English novels) that are at a suitable standard for their age group.

There is plenty of time to complete the reading, although we have some eager readers who have already finished the required 12 books. Completed PRC record sheets must be printed and handed in to the Library before 4 September 2020 so that we can input the data and submit it. Awards (certificates and medals) are usually sent to the school early in November.

Reading 12 books is not usually a challenge for most students, so we encourage them to create their own challenge targets after they have completed the PRC.
